

#### **Music Appreciation Society** (Or How to Enjoy the Performances)

At **WCMC**, and indeed most other Country Music clubs, we are always striving to strike the balance between the musical and social aspects of each show. We put them on so that everyone can enjoy the music and entertainment, while acknowledging that for many patrons this is a primary opportunity for social interaction, mostly manifested as having a chat.



To give you the opportunity to talk, we have longer breaks.



But when the balance fails there are always complaints about people talking while the band is playing. So **Ray** has to play bad cop and bring out the cane.

If you need to have an extended conversation, do so in the other room.

But while the band is playing - please use whisper mode.

So here are the guidelines we use to try and strike the right balance:


- Breaks: Initially we used to have 5-7 minute breaks between sets or artist changeovers. This did not give people enough time for their conversations, so they simply kept talking. Now we have 15 minute breaks. You can have a reasonable conversation or two in that time. Talk to you hearts content, unless you're asked to listen to specific announcements.
- Lights: when the artists are performing, we turn off the overhead lights. This is the signal to stop chatting and enjoy the performance. When the lights are on, talk all you want.
- Volume: The quality of equipment bands have today allows them to increase the volume without losing sound quality. Gone are the days of distortion and clipping. You may have noticed that some bands appear "louder" than others. This can be subjective, depending on individual hearing and tolerances. We generally allow the band to set their own volume levels and most of them are pretty good at getting it right. I reserve the ability to instruct bands to change their volume if needed. Some start a bit loud and turn down the volume on request. One of my standard instructions (sometimes giving quippingly) is "If you can hear people talking, turn up your volume until you can't hear them anymore". You get the idea.
- Walk arounds: This is the soft version of getting people to stop chatting. Ray walks around shushing people he spots being a bit rowdy.

Shhhhhhh ....please. When the music is on.

- Announcements: Sometimes the problem goes beyond gentle measures, and we must call it out.
- New idea: We've come up with another possible solution that I won't mention just yet it would spoil the surprise. It involves embarrassment and humour.

**The trap:** It's very easy to find yourself having a longer conversation when you thought it was going to be a quick answer to someone. And as our hearing gets worse, we have to talk louder. And we don't want to leave our seats every time. And some people are just naturally chatty. And that gets their neighbours upset. And they start complaining loudly..... see the spiral here?

**The solution:** We all must make a conscious effort to prioritise the music. It is a shared experience for our enjoyment. Sadly, the noise is also shared.


